## What does it cost? What is included?

VCQ Members: \$375; Non-members: \$405; Day Students VCQ member \$300; Non-members: \$325. (If you would like to become a VCQ member, please visit the web site at $\underline{w w w . v c q . o r g / i o i n . h t m .) ~ I n c l u d e s ~ l o d g i n g, ~ m e a l s, ~ a l l ~ w o r k s h o p s ~}$ (except kit fees \& supplies), lectures, and special events.

## What is the Vi Graves Celebration Scholarship?

The Vi Graves Celebration Scholarship was established to provide financial support for VCQ members to attend the biennial event. Vi was a VCQ member who loved Celebration and lost her life to cancer. Scholarships can be for the full Celebration cost, or partial, depending on need and funds available. Applications are submitted to the VCQ President who along with the Vice President will determine the number and amount of scholarships granted. This process is confidential. If a member would like to nominate a member to receive the scholarship, please submit the name to the President who will send the application form to the nominee, or submit a completed form on their behalf. The deadline for submission of the application for a Celebration scholarship is February 1, 2016. Application on page 28.

## How do I register?

Your $\$ 50$ non-refundable deposit must accompany your registration form (last page of brochure). A paid deposit reserves your space and will be deducted from the total cost. All deposits will be recorded in the sequence in which they are received with workshops assigned accordingly. Those attending the August meeting are given priority over individuals that are not attending the meeting. Mailed registrations will not be recorded until after the August meeting but will be processed according to when they were postmarked. Members only will be registered in August. Non-members will be registered beginning September 1. Please mail deposit made payable to VCQ (notation: Celebration 2016) and sent to: Heather Zavagnin, 87 White Oak Landing Rd, King William, VA 23086. Registration closes March 1, 2016 or earlier if capacity is reached.

## When is final payment due?

Final payments must be received by March 1, 2016. You may pay in installments, as long as the total is received by March 1, 2016. Remember to keep your VCQ membership up-to-date. ## What is the cancellation policy?

## The "It's Crystal Clear . . . We Are Quilters" challenge:

The challenge for Celebration 2016 is to make a small quilt with your interpretation of the theme, "It's Crystal Clear . . . We Are Quilters!"

The challenge quilts will be displayed at Celebration and will be eligible for several Viewers' Choice Awards. We encourage you to submit quilts from ALL genres of quilting - traditional, modern, pieced, applique, and art.

In support of the Virginia Quilt Museum, we suggest that you donate your quilt to the museum after Celebration so that it may become part of their fundraising quilt auction.

Quilt guidelines:

1. The size and shape of quilts is at your discretion.
2. Quilts must fit within the parameters of 9 " minimum by 24 " maximum. If your quilt is not rectangular, the diameter must fit within the 9" minimum and $24^{\prime \prime}$ maximum measurements.
3. Embellishments such as thread painting, beading, attaching crystals, etc. are allowed. We ask that embellishments that protrude or dangle from the quilt not be used as they require special handling in transporting.
4. Quilts must have some method of hanging attached which may vary depending on size. For larger quilts within the size range, a sleeve is probably most appropriate. Smaller quilts might have corner triangles or even a hanging loop, as long as the edges are stabilized and it hangs flat.
5. Especially if donating your quilt, include a label on the back with a title, your name as maker, and town you are from so whoever purchases your quilt will know who made it!

Design. Christine's engineering background and attention to detail worked well with Susan's graphic design experience and artistic training. Susan became the sole owner of Swirly Girls in 2014 and continues to design creative patterns with clearly written and illustrated instructions.
Swirly Girls Design has been featured in several magazines and the patterns are sold worldwide. In addition to design, Susan has hosted many Schoolhouse programs at International Quilt Market and provides trunk shows and workshops for quilt shops and guilds. In addition to quilt patterns and books, she has designed the Monogram Buttons for Dill Buttons and has collaborated on two rulers for Creative Grids. She designed fabric for Michael Miller Fabrics and created the Clubhouse Quilt Club, a progressive quilt program. Susan is actively involved in the quilting industry, a member of the International Association of Creative Arts Professionals, a founding member of Richmond Modern Quilt Guild and an Aurifil Thread Specialist.

## Rayna Gillman http://www.studio78.net/index.php

Rayna Gillman is an internationally known artist and teacher whose work has appeared in galleries and museums across the US. She works spontaneously in mixed media, often using collage and printmaking techniques to add texture to her work.
Rayna brings her intuitive sense of color and design into her work and her classes, infusing her students with a sense of play and encouraging them to use the words "what if?" as they experiment in their own work. She was nominated for the Teacher of the Year Award in 2010 by Professional Quilter Magazine.
She has a B.A. from Mount Holyoke College and studied at the Université de Strasbourg under a Fulbright Grant. She is the author of the best sellers, Create Your Own Free-Form Quilts, and Create Your Own HandPrinted Cloth, published by C\&T and nominated for two book awards.

## Diane Kirkhart https://www.jinnybeyer.com/instruction/instructors.cfm

Diane began her quilting career in the 90 s but has been a garment sewer since she was a child, learning her skills from her mother. She is an award-winning appliquér and hand quilter. Because of her exceptional handwork, she was chosen by Ellie Sienkiewicz to quilt a piece for her which appeared in a special exhibit in Houston in 2010 and later in Ellie's book, Ellie Sienkiewicz's Beloved Baltimore Album Quilts.

## Cheryl See http://www.cseesquilts.com/

Cheryl See has been quilting since 1993 and started C See's Quilts in 2013. Although Cheryl uses a variety of quilting techniques and styles, she is best known for her handwork, especially with English Paper Piecing. She is often referred to as the 'Hexpert' because of her love of hexagon quilts. In 2012, her quilt Star Struck won Best Hand Quilting for a large quilt in Paducah, Kentucky at the American Quilter's Society. Star Struck is now a part of the permanent collection of the National Quilt Museum in Paducah. In the summer of 2013, Cheryl was the featured artist at the Virginia Quilt Museum for a special exhibit titled 'Hexed'.
Her mission is to create quilt designs that inspire other quilters through lectures, workshops, and patterns. Although traditional techniques are often used to make her quilts, such as English Paper Piecing and hand quilting, this does not mean that the end result will be a traditional quilt.

## Victoria Findlay Wolfe http://bumblebeansinc.com/

Contemporary quilter Victoria Findlay Wolfe's quilts show her free modern exploration of the possibilities of the pattern by changing just one thing about it in each quilt. The results honor her roots in the Midwest and her grandmother Elda Wolfe's quilts and show Wolfe's striking originality. Victoria has fine art training and is a painter at heart who has sculpted, still does photography and basically isn't happy unless making something. She always knew she'd become some kind of artist but to her surprise QUILTS became her greatest passion... Victoria used her sewing abilities in her art, which was frowned on at the College of Visual Arts in St. Paul for being "too crafty". After she graduated, she focused all her efforts on art and moved to New York City in 1994. Starting out in NYC was intimidating and expensive, so she always had her sewing machine handy to whip up a few skirts for work. She painted furiously, had a few shows, but in the end, kept coming back to sewing. In 2008 Victoria saw a popular quilting blog online and thought "Hey! I can do that". Victoria's approach to QUILTING is very much the way she draws: using warm up exercises to get started... 15 minutes at a time... 15 minutes of "play" and inevitably a QUILT idea emerges. She has authored 2 books: 15 Minutes of Play and Double Wedding Ring Quilts.

## Workshop \#101

## LUCILLE AMOS - Mini Stars Table Runner

Mini Stars Table runner was designed as a tool to teach beginner quilters foundation paper piecing. 17 " $\times 51$ ". Techniques used: cutting and preparing foundation papers, floating points, paper piecing templates, paper piecing tutorial and tools for paper pieced quilting. Three large stars and four small stars make up this runner. There are two fabrics each in large stars; and two different fabrics in small stars; however it can be made with only two fabrics. There are enough foundation papers in the pattern to make two table runners.

## Mini Stars Table Runner Supply List \& Fabric Requirement

## General Class Supplies

Pattern will be for sale in class for $\$ 20$

- Iron/board
- Cutting Mat $18 \times 24$
- $6 \times 12$ ruler
- Scissors
- Rotary cutter with sharp blade
- Seam ripper
- Sewing machine with quarter inch foot and a snap on table that attaches to your sewing machine if possible
- Sewing machine needles - sharps - size 70 or 80


## Paper Piecing Supplies

- Add-a-Quarter ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ Ruler 12 inch
- Scotch tape
- UHU - glue stick
- Flower head pins

I actually used a jelly roll of 2.5 " strips for the different blues. I absolutely love the ocean and this quilt wraps the ocean around me.

So for themes you may want to think about:
A Beach Mystery (sand, water, shells, sea grass)
A Sunset Mystery (golds and browns)
A Garden Mystery (florals, I would use small prints)
A Scrappy Mystery (different backgrounds and your favorite scraps)
A Mountain Mystery (all the beautiful mountain hues)
A Seasonal Mystery (pick your favorite Season and all the colors you love for that season
A Christmas / Holiday Mystery
As you can see the possibilities are endless

## Supply List:

- Background fabric (this can all be the same fabric or you may use an assortment of tone on tone, neutrals, etc.
- Contrasting Color fabric - choose fabrics that will pop against your background. These strips will be 2.5 " so a jelly roll works well
- Set-in Triangles - I used a dark blue to "frame" my Mystery at Sea

## LUCILLE AMOS Indian Summer

Indian Summer is a $60^{\prime \prime} \times 69$ " quilt created by using 5 inch strips - 42 light strips and 42 dark strips make up the inside of the quilt. You may use any type of fabrics. This is a really fast quilt using foundation paper pattern. During the one-day class you will get several blocks completed. All the foundation papers you will need for quilt and border are included in the pattern.

## Supply List:

- Pattern - Indian Summer (instructor will have patterns for sale in class for $\$ 41.50$ )
- Template plastic , 1 sheet $12 \times 12$ or 2 sheets $81 / 2 \times 11$
- Rotary cutter with a new blade as we will be cutting through several layers of fabric.
- Mat $18 \times 24$
- Ruler $6 \times 12$ to cut your pattern templates
- Ruler $6 \times 24$ to cut your strips
- Add a quarter ruler (12 inches)
- Cotton thread high quality (poor thread breaks when removing paper)
- Glue stick

- Large zip lock bags (4- to put fabric pieces in as they are cut)
- Binder clips - medium size about 10 or 12 .
- Sewing machine with quarter inch foot, Size 70 or 80 needles
- Scissors
- Flower pins

## Fabric Requirements

- Cut 21 light fabrics into 5 inch strips $x$ the width of fabric. Do NOT use fat quarters.
- Cut 21 medium/dark fabrics into 5 inch strips $x$ the width of fabric (WOF). These fabrics are for the inside of quilt.
- For borders, you need to cut $21-61 / 2$ strips from your choice of fabric for border. (You may wait on cutting border fabrics, if you wish)

The great frontier in fabric today is surface design. Create an exciting 10 " x 78 " table runner or decorative hanging from your "custom" prints on silk (or cotton)! In the morning, explore using simple supplies like painters tape and freezer paper and combining them with stencils, silk screens and objects like lace and leaves. Experiment with instant -set Colorhue dye (for silk) and textile paint or DeColourant discharge paste (both for silk or cotton) to produce inventive, layered prints. In the afternoon, review basic design principles, color placement and simple piecing techniques, including how to "tame" unruly silk. Then cut and sew your prints. Finish by adding borders and a back, a rod pocket for hanging is optional. Expand your creative sills with this fun home décor project!

Hexie Daisy ${ }^{\text {M }}$ Flowers are then stuffed to really "pop" against a watercolor hexagon background. Make one to learn the technique and use your block for the front of a purse, book cover or make several to make a runner or wall hanging. Choose from 3/4" or 1" Paper Piece hexagons. Still can't get enough? You are now ready to EPP a larger project like Starlette or Star Struck!
Kit: No Fee Charged: 6 Paper Piece ovals and a circle for one Hexie Daisy ${ }^{\text {™ }}$ Flower in your choice of size to fit a 3/4" or 1" hexagon; Diagram for the layout of the basic Hexie Daisy ${ }^{\top M}$ Flower Block and wooden skewer for stuffing work.

## Supply List:

- Pins - appliqué, if you have them
- Thimble
- At least $50-3 / 4$ " or 1" Paper Piece hexagons (or they will be available for purchase)
$8-3 / 4$ " or 1" Paper Piece half hexagons (cut four hexagons down once from point to point to make eight or they will be available for purchase)
- Scraps of fabric 2" square for 3/4" hexagons (or 2-1/2" square for 1" hexagons) or precut into hexagons with 1/4" seam allowance. Do not pre-baste hexagons. Choose solids or small scale prints that read mostly one color. You will ideally need at least 50 fabrics of one color but 2 each of 25 will work (see note on scrap exchange below); mostly medium with a few darks and lights. Repeating a fabric once or twice will work as well. Fabric that has a bit of two colors next to each other on the color wheel like green and blue work great; if in doubt bring it.
- Charm square (5") or small piece of fabric for the appliquéd Hexie Daisy ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ Flower; I prefer a batik; you may choose black or the complimentary color of your blocks, but any color you wish is up to you
- Thread - bring several colors to match your appliqué and background color
- Small Clover Wonder Clips - if you have them
- Pen for taking notes: flat cap on pen will become helpful
- Pencil and marking tool that will show on chosen appliqué fabric
- Small scraps of batting
- C See's Scroll - portable design mat (these will be available for purchase)

Scrap Exchange: We aren't all lucky enough to have 50 different fabrics in one color in our stash especially in certain colors. I encourage you to precut 2" squares in 10 different fabrics of one color to exchange with other quilters. Place fabric in a baggie and seal. You could exchange a pack of 102"squares of blue for a bag of orange, for example. You can get 90-2" squares or 56-21/2" squares from one fat quarter.

To make this quilt scrappy:
- 6 yards of a setting fabric (background)
- 7 yards of a variety of 26-28 prints
- Or, Use the same formula as the Solids... 25-28 FQ's variety of prints

Located approximately 25 miles southeast of Roanoke VA, it is easily accessible from all parts of Virginia.

## From Roanoke

From I-81 take exit 143, I-581 S (220 S), through Roanoke and Boones Mill. Continue past Boones Mill on 220 S for 4.2 miles to Wirtz Rd. (Rt. 697). (There will be an Exxon \& Dairy Queen on the left, Plateau Park \& Franklin Motel on the right.) Turn LEFT onto Wirtz Rd. (Rt. 697). Follow Wirtz Rd. for 5 miles to the stop sign. At stop sign, turn LEFT onto Rt. 122 N (Booker T. Washington Highway). Go 1 mile to Burnt Chimney Rd. Turn RIGHT onto Burnt Chimney Rd. (Rt. 670). Follow Burnt Chimney Rd. for 6.7 miles to Rt. 668. (Dudley's Schoolhouse Store will be on the right directly past the road.) Turn RIGHT onto Rt. 668 (Lovely Valley Rd.). Follow for 0.7 miles to the stop sign. Turn RIGHT onto Rt. 944 (Crafts Ford Rd.). Follow for 1.6 miles to a sharp curve. Turn left onto Hermitage Rd. (Rt. 669). Follow Hermitage Rd. to the 4-H Center.

## From Lynchburg / Bedford

From Rt. 460, take second Bedford exit for Rt. 122 S (There will be signs for Smith Mountain Lake.) At traffic light, take a left or right (depends on your direction) onto 122 S . Go 19.8 miles to a traffic light at the intersection of Rt. 122 and Rt. 616 (Optical Office on right). Turn LEFT onto Scruggs Rd. (Rt. 616). Go 0.8 miles and take a RIGHT (shortly past Dairy Queen) onto Brooks Mill Rd. (Rt. 834). (The green street sign will be on the left side of the road.). Go 2.8 miles until you come to a stop sign. (Dick's Food Center will be directly in front of you.). Take a LEFT onto Burnt Chimney Rd. Go 2.5 miles to Rt. 668. (Dudley's Schoolhouse Store will be on the right directly past the road.) Turn RIGHT onto Rt. 668 (Lovely Valley Rd). Follow for 0.7 miles to the stop sign. Turn RIGHT onto Rt. 944 (Crafts Ford Rd). Follow for 1.6 miles to a sharp curve. Turn left onto Hermitage Rd. (Rt. 669). Follow Hermitage Rd. to the 4-H Center.

## From Northern Virginia

Take EITHER Interstate 81 South to exit 143 (Interstate 581 South/220 South) to Roanoke and follow directions above from Roanoke, OR take Route 29 South to Lynchburg and follow directions above from Lynchburg.

## From Richmond or Tidewater Area

Take EITHER Route 460 West and use directions from Lynchburg OR take Interstate 64 West to Interstate 81 South and take exit 143, and follow the directions from Roanoke.

## From Martinsville, South \& North Carolina

On 220 N, take second Rocky Mount exit to Rt. 40 E/W. At end of ramp take a RIGHT onto Rt. 40 E . Go almost 1 mile to Rt. 122 N (You will pass through 4 stoplights; Rt. 122 N is the fourth light.) Take a LEFT onto Rt. 122 N (Booker T. Washington Hwy.). Follow Rt. 122 N for 6.8 miles to Burnt Chimney Road and follow directions from Roanoke.

## From Southeast - Tennessee

From I-81 take exit 143 to I-581 south to Roanoke and follow the directions from Roanoke
